



# Online Safety at Woodthorpe

Summer 1



At Woodthorpe, we teach Online Safety through our Respect Curriculum. We follow the Education for a Connected World Framework, published by the UK Council for Internet Safety. Each year group explores the same strand at the same time, with learning also being shared in whole school assemblies. Here is an overview of what we will be learning this half term.

## Online Reputation

This strand explores the concept of reputation and how others may use online information to make judgements. It offers opportunities to develop strategies to manage personal digital content effectively and capitalise on technology's capacity to create effective positive profiles.

### Reception

Children in Reception will be learning what the words 'information' and 'online' means. They will learn that people can put information online for others to see.

### Year 1

Year 1 children will be learning what types of information can be shared and what they should not put online without asking a trusted adult first.

### Year 2

Children in Year 2 will be exploring who to talk to if something has been put online without consent or if it is incorrect.

## Growing Healthy Habits for an Online World

Digi Daisy is our school online safety mascot. She was designed by one of our pupils and made into a puppet to use in school. She helps us grow healthy habits when using devices. We will share more about each habit below. Do chat with your child about the habits - they are helpful habits to have at home and at school.



Move

**Digi Daisy says it's important to move regularly when using a device.**

Long periods in front of a screen are unhealthy. Children need to be encouraged and reminded to have breaks and to move and stretch before returning. In school, we teach children to take short breaks away from the screen and to rest their eyes by looking away at regular intervals.
