For example, discussing characters' actions in a story can model democratic values by showing the importance of listening to others and valuing different perspectives.</p> <p>Activities like group storytelling or shared writing involve making decisions together, fostering an understanding of democratic processes</p>	<p>Many texts feature moral lessons and the consequences of actions, helping children understand the importance of rules. For instance, fairy tales often demonstrate the outcomes of following or breaking societal norms.</p> <p>When discussing classroom agreements or behavioural norms, teachers can relate these to themes in stories, reinforcing the idea of rules being essential for a harmonious environment.</p>	<p>Children are encouraged to write stories, poems, or descriptions that reflect their ideas and choices, fostering a sense of freedom in expression.</p> <p>Through character analysis, children learn to appreciate personal freedom and decision-making, seeing how different choices affect outcomes in narratives.</p>	<p>The development of listening and speaking skills, teaching children to value others' contributions during discussions and storytelling.</p> <p>Stories that highlight themes of kindness, friendship, and cooperation encourage mutual respect among peers.</p> <p>Our curriculum includes stories and texts from various cultures, exposing children to different traditions, beliefs, and ways of life.</p> <p>Teachers facilitate conversations about characters, settings, and customs in stories that differ from the children's own experiences, fostering an understanding and appreciation of diversity.</p>
